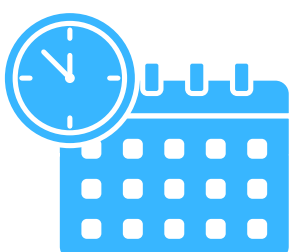

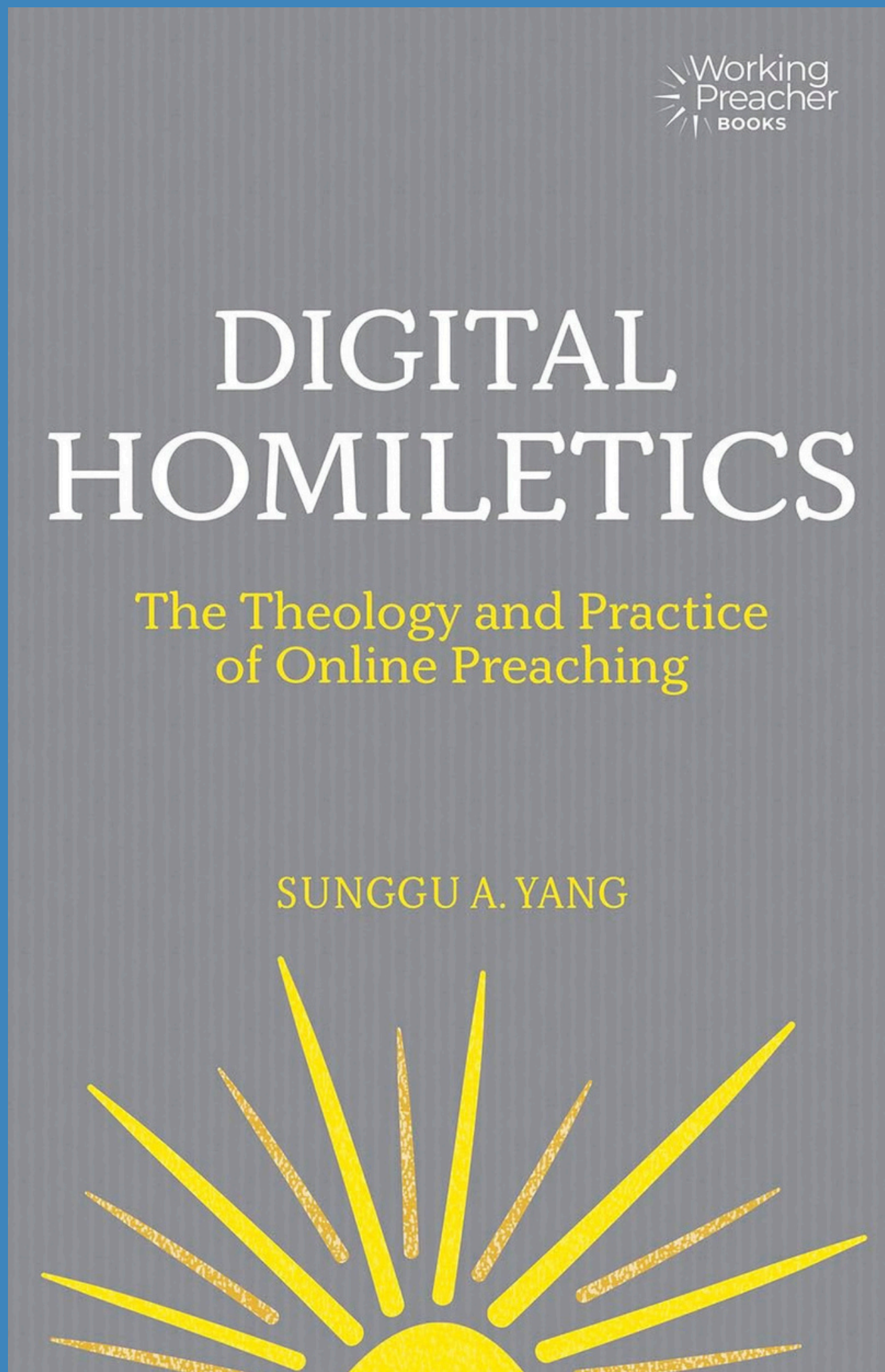


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Sunggu Yang

Proclaiming Hope amid Suffering

Professor Eliana Ah-Rum Ku at the Graduate School of Practical Theology in South Korea has published *Lament-Driven Preaching: Proclaiming Hope amid Suffering*.

This book serves as a response to the challenge that how to proclaim hope in the midst of suffering. As the Christian community grapples with the inevitable suffering that accompanies human existence, this inquiry delves into the palpable dissonance between the experiential perception of divine absence and the doctrinal assurances of a benevolent and omnipresent God.

The book advocates for a robust engagement with lamentation as a profound theological stance characterized by fervent expression, witnessing, and both personal and communal resistance against the manifestations of evil and injustice. This call is underpinned by a profound yearning for the divine salvific presence amid the tangible realities of suffering.

Drawing on diverse discourses, including the book of Lamentations, the Korean concept of han and hanpuri, the narrative of the Paschal Triduum (with particular emphasis on Holy Saturday), and contemporary homiletical discussions on suffering, the book explores the capacity of sermons to navigate the intricate dynamics of grief and hope without trivializing the severe impact of suffering.

Aimed primarily at enriching the homiletical perspectives/practices of preachers, the book elucidates how lament can serve not only as a manifestation of faith but also as the quintessential language of the Gospel. It does not seek to mediate or reconcile the polarities of suffering and hope; rather, it endeavors to mine the profound tension existing between these two states, thereby offering a richer, more nuanced articulation of the Christian faith in the context of human suffering.

PREACHING ON SOCIAL SUFFERING



*Formulating a Homiletical Theology for the
Contemporary Korean Context*

foreword by Sally A. Brown

April 16th marks the tenth anniversary of the Sewol ferry disaster. Despite the passage of time, there are many who still clutch the vivid scars of this tragedy. Specifically, during this period, the pulpits of Korean Protestant churches have found themselves at the center of social controversy, having failed to fully assume social and religious responsibilities in the wake of the Sewol and other societal disasters in Korean history.

Dr. Jeremy Kangsan Kim (Praise Presbyterian Church, NJ) observed the reality of these Korean church pulpits and published *Preaching on Social Suffering: Formulating a Homiletical Theology for the Contemporary Korean*. This book defines the various political and social traumas experienced by Korean society in the last century as 'social suffering' and analyzes the preaching theology of Korean Protestantism that has dealt with these issues. It points out that homiletics concerning social suffering has developed dichotomously into pastoral and prophetic perspectives. The former has trivialized issues requiring social implications by substituting social suffering with individual pain, reducing them to matters of personal faith, while the latter has fallen into the error of generalizing individual suffering by focusing solely on social transformation based on God's justice.

To integrate these bifurcated approaches, the author proposes biblical lamentation as a theological alternative. Lamentation, exceeding a mere individual petition, encompasses God's compassion towards those who suffer from a pastoral perspective and simultaneously represents resistance based on God's justice against an unjust social community from a prophetic stance. Notably, the author discovers the dual nature of biblical lamentation in 'ren (仁)'—a key virtue of Neo-Confucianism that has deeply influenced Korean thought, representing an understanding of the Other (ren = compassion + righteousness)—and suggests it as a hermeneutical framework that can integrate divided homiletic approaches while also complementing the shortcomings of Western theories of the Other developed after World War II.

The author proposes a homiletic for social suffering that responds to the sociopolitical and theological context of Korea. Through this, Korean preachers are challenged to see the homiletical responsibility toward the suffered others socially as a contemporary missional mandate and a homiletic task given to us today.
